**Course Description:** This course aims to familiarize students with recent advancements in the field of economic inequality research. Due to an increased availability of individual-level data, there has been notable growth of high-quality studies

examining the sources, consequences, and interactions of economic disparities in recent years. Through engagement with current academic literature, this course exposes students to state-of-the-art research on factors influencing income and wealth distributions. Students will build skills for comprehending empirical analyses and theoretical frameworks around distributional economics. The course focuses heavily on distilling insights from frontier publications to equip students to actively participate in this rapidly developing area of economic study.

**Grading:** The final grade will be on a term project/presentation, some quizzes/assignment(s), and a cumulative final exam. The weights are as follows:

- Quizzes/Assignment(s)/Attendance: 20%
- Term Project/Presentation: 40%
- Final Exam: 40%

Quizzes, the dates of which will *not* be announced in advance, will cover course materials and readings.

Assignment(s) will be intended to contribute to your grasp of data, methodology, and theory.

The term project and its presentation will be based on inequality-related topics, the details of which I will share throughout the class. I will expect the group report to be written using  $\text{L}^{\text{A}}\text{T}_{\text{E}}\text{X}$  and the group presentation to be prepared using Beamer (a  $\text{L}^{\text{A}}\text{T}_{\text{E}}\text{X}$ -based presentation platform).
